University Community Vision 2030

OVERVIEW

In 2011, The College Park City-University Partnership (The Partnership) launched the University District Vision 2020, which was supported by the Mayor and City Council and the President of the University of Maryland. The initiative focused on five key strategy areas: Housing and Development; Transportation; Public Safety; Education; and Sustainability. The Partnership established metrics to track progress in each strategy area. In 2019-2020, the Partnership launched a planning process to establish goals and strategies for the next decade.

DATA AND RESEARCH

• The Vision 2030 process included an examination of progress across the Vision 2020 metrics, as well as other key trends that occurred within between 2011 and 2019 and provided research on comparison cities.

STAKEHOLDER FEEDBACK

- The Partnership held eight engagement sessions with Key Stakeholders three general, and one for each strategy area.
- Participants reflected on data/trends, discussed progress made, and developed possible future goals and strategies.
 Following the stakeholder engagement sessions, the Partnership worked to translate stakeholder feedback and ideas into a new vision.

ADOPTION

• The University-Community Vision 2030 was adopted by the University and the City of College Park

University Community Vision 2030

Vision Statement: In 2030, College Park is a **growing**, **thriving**, **equitable**, and **sustainable** community, united by a **robust alliance** between the City, University, and community. College Park enjoys a strong **local** economy, rooted in university research, start-ups, and creative entrepreneurship. Neighborhoods and commercial areas are **safe**, **healthy** and **walkable**, and **well-served** by transit. College Park is attractive to both current and new residents for the strength of its abundant housing, employment, and Pre-K – 12 school options. College Park is a **destination** for its restaurants, shopping, parks and natural areas, and entertainment.

Focus Areas: The 2030 University Community Vision will have **4 consolidated focus areas**:





Community Preservation Trust

A Maryland Certified Affordable Housing Land Trust

The Trust is a shared-equity program that provides access to affordable homeownership in College Park:

- Trust sells homes below market rate to incomequalified homebuyers
- Participating homebuyers can earn up to 140% median family income (HUD)
- To date, the Partnership has raised \$15 million in federal, state and City funding to support this effort
- Exploring graduate student rental opportunities and expanding Trust investments
- Received the **2023 Pioneering Impact Award** from the Community Development Network of Maryland





Live+Work College Park

Downpayment & Closing Cost Assistance Program

Live+Work College Park:

- \$20,000, 7-year forgivable loan assistance to new homeowners in College Park
- 10-year owner occupancy requirement
- Must be a full-time employee of a business located in College Park

*Supports our **neighborhood stabilization** efforts, provides access to **homeownership**, and supports our **sustainability** goals by reducing commutes.






Campus Drive Bicycle Path & Riverwalk

Transportation improvements

- Total of \$3,793,000 in 6 bond bills in multiple funding years (2020, 2021, 2023)
- 2-year coordination process with multiple agencies: City, UMD, M-NCPPC
- Construction anticipated to begin spring/summer 2024
